Native Plants and Pets

Q: What Michigan native plants are potentially poisonous to pets?

A: Most animals instinctively avoid plants that are toxic, however if ingested and depending upon volume/weight of animal these plants may cause a variety of symptoms ranging from mild discomfort to severe reactions. Here is a list of Michigan native plants in that could be harmful if consumed by your pet:

Arrowhead (Sagittaria latifolia) Flowering Spurge (Euphorbia corollata) Foxglove Beardstongue (Penstemon digitalis) Hairy Beardstongue (Penstemon hirsutus) Jack in the Pulpit (Arisaema triphyllum) Poison Ivy (Toxicodendron radicans) Poison Oak (Toxicodendron pubescens) Poison Sumac (Toxico vernix) Virgin's Bower (Clematis virginiana) Wild Iris (Iris spp) Wild Lupine (Lupinus perennis) Yarrow (Achilliea millefolium)
